The Lights are On and Somebody is Home



Lisa Perry is an inspirational success story. Before contracting Covid-19 and becoming a "long-hauler", Lisa was a professional, self-sufficient, business-savvy entrepreneur. Due to her illness, she lost her income and her home, and needed help. "In the blink of an eye, everything can be taken away from you, and for me, it was. No money, no car, no place to live, no job." Lisa was able to rely on family and few close friends, but depression and the feeling of worthlessness set in. "You need to get the will to rely on the community" she said. First by calling 211 for community resources, Lisa found the Hazelwood Community Center, Neighborhood Place, then HCM. But it took many phone calls and still much time and patience waiting at TARC stops to be where she is today... in a new apartment with a positive outlook. "Be grateful. How blessed I was in the midst of the storm. HCM has been instrumental in helping me, and still is, and I will never forget it."

HCM's Emergency Financial Assistance Program helps our clients, Louisville residents in 40204, 40205, and parts of 40218, pay the rent and electric and water bills so they can keep the lights on and their own roof over their heads. This program is funded through grants, congregational support, and private donations. To find out if you are eligible for help, call HCM's Assistance Director, Danah Smith, to setup an appointment. The Association of Community Ministries (ACM) is an umbrella organization bringing 13 Louisville-based Community Ministries together to serve families and individuals on a neighborhood level throughout the entirety of Metro Louisville. ACM's members have worked together for over 35 years connecting neighbors in need with resources during times of crisis.

Their success is built upon the strong relationships they have not just with those they serve but also - and very importantly - the relationships they have with their partners, supporters, advocates, and volunteers, as well as Board members, member congregations and staff.

It is all of these people collaborating together that make ACM's work possible, that brings emergency assistance, be it food, utilities, rent, or other services to community members when they need it the most.

Food Pantry Volunteers Save the Day!

HCM's Dare to Care Food Pantry takes a small army of volunteers to serve 500+ clients with emergency food orders, fresh produce, and personal care items every month. Dare to Care is the main source of food donations, but Kroger, ValuMarket, and Wiltshire Pantry donate weekly. Neighborhood Associations such as Cherokee Triangle, Bonnycastle Homestead, Highlands-Douglass, and Tyler Park, in addition to our supporting congregations, hold food drives regularly. Also importantly our friends and neighbors buy and place groceries into the Highlands Kroger and ValuMarket donation barrels!



Retired Social Worker and HCM neighbor, Laura Walker, has been volunteering in HCM's Food Pantry for 3 years. "I like knowing clients by name, the face-to-face interaction with them, and that we give them something tangible." During

the pandemic, she increased her hours. "It really helped with isolation and it helped the community."

Seniors Get the VIP Treatment

HCM's Senior Lunch & Activity Program is open Monday - Friday 10am to 1pm for Louisville Seniors age 60+. Enrichment activities, games, and exercise are followed by a free lunch where seniors can socialize and have a safe place to go. The Senior Center is located in HCM's Main Campus at 1228 E. Breckinridge St.

Seniors enjoy activities such as painting, bingo, exercises, crafts, movies, and more. With the help of a Kentucky Colonel's Grant, HCM was able to purchase a used passenger van for our Senior Outreach Program (as well as for our partnership with Kentucky Refugee Ministries, allowing refugee children to play soccer in our youth recreation leagues). Starting in October, we will transport seniors living at Highlands Court Apartments on Richmond Dr. monthly to Kroger, Walmart, and to our food pantry for \$3/person.

While daily hot meals have not yet returned, frozen meals delivered once a week provide nutrition, socialization, and a wellness check for these vulnerable residents. HCM takes pride in being a Meals on Wheels distribution location, working with Louisville Metro and KIPDA to continue it's long tradition of Senior Outreach.

With the proposed redevelopment of the former Urban Government Center (original Baptist Hospital) in the Paristown Pointe neighborhood, across from HCM's main campus on Breckinridge St., between Vine St. and Barret Ave., came an opportunity for HCM to expand its outreach in serving Louisville's senior community and childcare services.

Working with Steve Smith of Paristown Preservation Trust, the current chosen developer of the UGC, and Flaherty & Collins Properties of Indianapolis, a plan for a 72 unit affordable senior housing complex above a 6,000 SF childcare center on the grounds of HCM's main campus has been proposed for Phase I of the UGC redevelopment.

While approval of the Paristown Preservation Trust's overall plan is still under consideration by Louisville Metro, HCM is optimistic that the proposal will come to fruition, expanding HCM's long-time and original mission of helping seniors in our area with quality and affordable housing as well as parents in Louisville with quality and affordable childcare.
